

Brian Czech is the founding president and acting executive director of the Center for the Advancement of the Steady State Economy, a non-profit organization dedicated to advancing the steady state economy as the sustainable alternative to economic growth. Brian is also an interdisciplinary biologist in the headquarters of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, where he has worked since 1999. For most of that time he was also a visiting professor of natural resource economics in Virginia Tech's National Capitol Region. Czech has developed and taught courses in ecological economics, endangered species policy and management, climate change and natural resources, wildlife ecology and management, and steady state economics. He is the author of three books: Supply Shock; Shoveling Fuel for a Runaway Train; and (with Paul R. Krausman) The Endangered Species Act: History, Conservation Biology, and Public Policy. He has had more than 50 articles published in over 20 peer-reviewed journals, indicating the breadth of his studies, and has spoken at more than 100 universities in approximately 20 countries. Brian has played a leading role in engaging professional societies and environmental NGOs in ecological macroeconomics. He is a regular contributor to the Huffington Post and the Daly News, a blog focused on the steady state economy. Czech has a B.S. from the University of Wisconsin, an M.S. from the University of Washington, and a Ph.D. from the University of Arizona.
